From 1857 to 1928, the museum building was the Peterborough Infirmary, the first hospital for the city. Primary sources in the museum collection and census records from 1911 have been used in planning this fully immersive experience day.

National Curriculum links: History, English, PSHE

Learning objectives:

In this 'Edith Cavell & Other Past Lives' experience, pupils will:

- learn about the lives of significant individuals in the past who have contributed to national and international medical practice achievements (Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole, Edith Cavell, Joseph Lister, Alfred C Taylor)
- learn about a significant historical site in their own locality.
- show an understanding of aspects of Victorian/Edwardian life (or a past life) and be able to compare with life of today.
- be able to identify similarities and differences between ways of life in different periods.
- develop an awareness of the past, using common words and phrases relating to the passing of time.
- appreciate that artefacts help us to understand the past.
- participate in discussions, role-play and improvisations.
- show understanding that good practices can contribute to good health
- identify dangers and describe some appropriate safety measures in the home.

Other information:

Duration:	Full day (10 am – 2 pm).
Cost:	£200 per group. Our minimum charge for school groups of 25 or less students is £180.
Maximum group size:	Maximum number per group is 35. We can accommodate up to three groups.
Recommended ratio:	Minimum 1 adult to 6 students.
Booking information:	To book, please contact us by phone or email. When the activities and date are agreed, a booking form and risk assessment is emailed to you. To confirm the visit we ask that you complete the booking form and email it back to us.
A note about behaviour:	Members of the school staff have overall responsibility for the behaviour of their pupils and we expect you to support Museum staff with this where necessary. As you know, pupils benefit significantly when school staff and adults also get involved in the activities so please join in where appropriate.
Alternative options:	Instead of making nurse and doctor hats, we offer an 'All Action' guided city tour if appropriate to your group and to the timings. And feel free to come dressed in Victorian clothing – pupils and adults!
